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


INCLINE VILLAGE TENNIS CENTER 964 Incline Way • 775-832-1235

Here at Diamond Peak, we're very excited to welcome all of our old friends and new faces back to this hidden gem of a ski resort. If you're one of our long-time locals, you already know about the beautiful views, the incredible tree skiing/riding, and the familyfriendly funnel that makes it easy to meet up with your group in the Base Area, no matter what lever of skier or rider you are.

If you're new to the area, welcome! We can't wait to show you what we offer right here in your very own backyard: Like Tahoe's 4th most skiable vertical (1,840 feet!), Tahoe's most breathtaking view, and Tahoe's most welcoming vibe. Also the fact that we can cover 75% of all the developed terrain on the mountain with snowmaking (our insurance policy in case Mother Nature needs a little extra help this winter.)

While we haven't changed much in the winning formula that has made Diamond Peak a locals' favorite since we opened our doors back in 1966 as Ski Incline, we did complete a lot of work this summer (as anyone who came by the base area can attest to)...

Diamond Peak Culvert Rehabilitation Project

One of the goals of the Incline Village General Improvement District is to maintain, renew, expand, and enhance District infrastructure to meet the capacity needs and desires of the community for future generations while ensuring safe and accessible operations for the public and our workforce. And sometimes we have to rip up the entire Base Area to do so.

In the 1960s, Boise Cascade installed a 72-inch in diameter corrugated metal pipe culvert in order to facilitate the construction of the base area of Ski Incline. Within the Diamond Peak base area, Incline Creek runs through the culvert that extends approximately 1,800-feet from the upper parking lot to the Schoolhouse Lift. Another culvert branches off the 72inch culvert approximately 4,000-feet from the Diamond Peak Skier Services Building, up the Lodgepole run, to mid-way up the Spillway run to accommodate mountain runoff in the spring.

You may remember that a portion of this upper culvert was replaced during the summer of 2017, and the remaining sections of the culvert were replaced this past summer to continue to convey surface drainage water across and under the Diamond Peak ski area. This infrastructure project – while entirely underground and out of view – will serve the resort and the water quality of the Tahoe Basin for 50+ years to come.

School Yard Regrading Bonus Project

As an added bonus of completing the culvert work, we were able to leverage some extra dirt that was available after the culvert repair to level out the School House run and the base area. This will provide a better beginner experience as well as improving efficiencies in snowmaking time and expenses. The School Yard beginner run is one of the most popular learn-to-ski/snowboard venues in the Tahoe Basin, so we're very excited to offer more room and a more consistent slope this winter.

Ridge Chair Maintenance

Few chairlifts in the Tahoe Basin (the world?) are as classic as the Ridge chairlift at Diamond Peak. Originally named "Upper Yellow" when it was installed back in 1969, and renamed "Yellow Jacket" for a period after that, the classic double-seater Ridge chair got a fantastic new safety upgrade this summer with the installation of restraint bars.

Our Lift Maintenance staff collaborated with industry safety experts and engineers who were familiar with these types of Yan chairlifts to design new restraint bars. These bars were fabricated especially for Diamond Peak and installed this summer. This completed a three-year maintenance project on the Ridge chair, which also included a new A/C motor and variable frequency drive, low-voltage control system, communications line between the terminals, and push-button controls. And while all these upgrades excite our lift operators, what's important to our guests is that the Ridge chair remains the classic experience it always has been – now with enhanced safety features. Come give it a ride this winter!

INTRODUCING THE NEW VILLAGE TERRAIN PARK

New for the 2018-19 season, terrain park skiers and riders, as well as those new to terrain park features, will enjoy a brand new venue to progress their skills as Diamond Peak's master park builders will be concentrating the resort's terrain park features in a new lower-mountain zone called "The Village Terrain Park at Diamond Peak."

"We're trying to create more than just a new terrain park here at Diamond Peak," said Matt Melilli, Diamond Peak's Slope Maintenance Manager and Lead Terrain Park Builder. "We want to build this into a place where you can feel a part of something... part of a community."

Accessible from all areas of the mountain, the new Village Terrain Park location will allow park riders to explore more of the mountain before taking a lap through the park, or simply enjoy quick park-only laps via the Red Fox chairlift. The Village Terrain Park will take over what used to be the Penguin and Dusty's Delight ski runs, as well as a portion of lower Wiggle, creating a comprehensive arena for Diamond Peak's park staff to build features for all ability levels and conditions. Centralizing Diamond Peak's terrain parks will also allow park staff to spend more time grooming and maintaining the features to ensure consistent conditions and maximum fun.

The Village terrain park is the brainchild of Melilli and Assistant Slope Maintenance Manager Tim Hay, both of whom have extensive experience constructing boundary-pushing terrain park features for events such as the Burton U.S. Open, the Dew Tour, and Snowboard Magazine's annual Superpark competition. Both Melilli and Hay are excited to debut a huge selection of new progression-oriented boxes and rails in The Village Terrain Park this winter, as well as show off the shaping capabilities of Diamond Peak's two PistenBully Park Pro grooming machines.

UNIFORMS REPURPOSED

Where do the retired uniforms go?

The Diamond Peak uniforms are used for four seasons and then retired, collected, packaged, and delivered to the National Ski Areas Association for distribution through the Sharing Warmth around the Globe (SWAG) program. The SWAG program collects retired garments from ski resorts and distributes them outside of the United States to cold weather countries in order to provide to individuals in need of warm clothing. "I have seen firsthand in places like Albania, Poland and Nepal what a warm jacket can provide to those in need. The generosity of Diamond Peak Ski Resort and all the participating resorts from the National Ski Area Association is warming people around the globe," said Cheryl Jensen, founder of the SWAG program.

Over 278,000 winter garments have been delivered overseas by National Ski Areas Association's SWAG program since the start of the program in 2000. After the 2016-17 season, Diamond Peak retired and donated:

- 215 ski jackets
- 215 soft shell jackets
- 430 ski pants

Every Saturday, February 9 through April 13 (no event Feb. 16), enjoy beautiful views of Lake Tahoe from Snowflake Lodge while tasting fine wines or craft brews paired with tasty appetizers. At the end of the event, ski or snowboard down a freshly groomed run at sunset. Last Tracks tickets are \$75 (\$70 for season pass holders) and include a lift ticket valid from 2-4 p.m. Participants must be 21 years old and ski or snowboard at an intermediate level. March 24: 19th Annual Dummy Downhill

Join us for the 19th Annual Dummy Downhill where participants build a dummy on skis or snowboards that get launched off of a big jump and watch as unique characters fly down the hill or crash hard. This is Diamond Peak's signature spring event and biggest party of the year. Even non-skiers will want to come watch the madness! Dummies will be judged on creativity on the Base Lodge deck, followed by the jumping and an awards ceremony. Race to the top of the mountain using whatever human-powered method you prefer: skins, snowshoes, running shoes, etc. Then race back down to the finish line. For those of a less competitive nature, a recreational course is available. The weekend also includes fun activities in the base area including ski boot races, live music, fun relays, and more. Costumes are encouraged!

TIPS FOR BEGINNERS

January is National Learn to Ski and Snowboard Month and National Safety Month at the ski resorts.

Combining these two are fitting as most ski programs stress the importance of safety, fun and learning. Below are a few tips for those learning how to ski or snowboard this season.

Be prepared Weather can change rapidly in the mountains so layering is your best option. You can add or take off layers as you get warmer or colder. Wear water resistant gloves, snow pants and don't forget eye protection such as goggles or sunglasses. Not only do they protect your eyes from the sun but also wraparound sunglasses or goggles can help shield your eyes from the wind. The sun reflects off the snow on sunny and cloudy days so wear sunscreen and lip balm with SPF.

Stay fueled and hydrated The combination of high altitude, exercise and sun can dehydrate so drink plenty of water and avoid diuretics such as coffee and alcohol. Eat a good breakfast, something with whole grains and protein that will give you the energy you need. Stash an energy bar in your jacket for a mid morning snack to keep you going strong until lunchtime.

Take a lesson Friends don't let friends teach friends. Although your friend or family member may be a great skier or snowboarder, it's not the best idea to let them teach you. Learning something new can be frustrating and you'll want to have the best experience and not jeopardize your relationship. Let a trained ski or snowboard instructor teach you the basics to start with a good foundation and help prevent bad habits and injuries. They have taught hundreds, if not thousands, of beginners and know how to explain and demonstrate the essential skills and form of skiing and snowboarding. Diamond Peak's professional instructors, low student-to-instructor ratio, dedicated children's learning area, gentle slopes, and a friendly environment provide an ideal place for first-time skiers and snowboarders and those looking to improve their skills and confidence.

INCREASE ENDURANCE ON THE SLOPES

The best way to end a day on the slopes and trails, and prepare for the next is with a therapeutic massage. Massage will leave the body recharged, revitalized and hasten muscle recovery after a day of vigorous physical activity. Massage is believed to raise the levels of the body's natural painkillers (endorphins) and also releases muscle spasm, reducing the pressure on nerve endings in tight muscles that can cause pain during physical activity. Massage is the perfect solution for tired muscles that do not perform as well as they should after a tough day on the mountain.


Research has shown that in relation to exercise and athletic participation massage can

- Reduce muscle tension
- Promote relaxation
- Increase range of motion
- Improve soft tissue function
- Support the recovery of heart rate variability and diastolic blood pressure after high-intensity exercise

- Decrease muscle stiffness and fatigue after exercise
- Improve exercise performance
- Decrease delayed onset muscle soreness
- Reduce swelling
- Enhance athletic performance
- Enhance sleep, which will in turn lower fatigue
- Reduce the risk of injury
- Improve flexibility
- Remove waste products
- Reduce muscle soreness
- Breaks down adhesions and scar tissue

So if you want to increase your stamina and performance on multiple days of skiing or other winter activities get a therapeutic massage.

CHOOSE THE RIGHT SKIS

Ski technology has rapidly progressed in the last few years, making many types of skis available to choose from. Powder skis, racing skis, twin tips, all mountain, carving and the list goes on.

The reason why there are so many types of skis is that different ski conditions call for different equipment. Choosing the right equipment can make a good day on the mountain even better. Here are a few tips and reminders on how to choose your weapon, or the right pair of skis for the conditions.

Skis designed for softer/deeper snow: Powder skis are usually 100+mm width underfoot and may have rocker such as tip rocker, tip and tail rocker or full rocker. Generally speaking, the fatter the ski and the more rocker it has, the easier it is to ski as the snow gets deeper. You want your skis to float in the powder and this design helps them do just that.

Skis designed for groomed snow and carved turns: If it is not a powder day you want to choose a narrower ski that's easier to maneuver on groomed terrain. Waist widths can vary from 65mm underfoot to approximately 80mm and generally have little or no rocker. These types of skis will have more sidecut, making the skis quicker edge to edge and more effective when carving on harder snow.


This winter, Tahoe will have an abundance of great groomed trails to ski and the best way to enjoy these conditions is on a pair of carving skis or carving snowboard. Carving skis have a narrower waist, making it easier to carve a turn and ideal for groomers, man-made snow and hard pack. Most carving skis are on a track system so your boots sit higher. This additional height gives you more advantage and power to make that perfect carved turn. For snowboards, you will want to ride something with a reinforced heel edge. This helps you grip on your heel edge better when carving at high speeds and is easier on the legs.

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STOKE CERTIFICATION Diamond Peak Ski Resort Achieves Stoke Certification For Sustainability

Renowned for its panoramic views of Lake Tahoe, Diamond Peak Ski Resort is now recognized for their sustainability initiatives as the first ski resort in Lake Tahoe to become STOKE Certified. As one of the early adopters of the STOKE Snow certification program during the 2015-16 season, the community-owned ski resort has been diligently following their Roadmap Report to achieve best practices in snowmaking, interpretation, waste diversion, and community development.

STOKE Certified—the Sustainable Tourism Operator's Kit for Evaluation—is the world's first sustainability certification body with standards built specifically for surf and ski tourism operators. The organization was founded with a mission to assist resorts in developing systematic approaches to sustainability, environmental responsibility, customer loyalty, and staff retention.

"My love for snowboarding, and passion for protecting mountain playgrounds was born from my first turns above Lake Tahoe at Diamond Peak," said STOKE Certified Co-Founder Carl Kish. "Ultimately, it's what inspired me to create STOKE. This has come full circle for me and words cannot describe how grateful I am to Diamond Peak for believing in STOKE from day one and representing the program with integrity."

During the 2017-18 ski season, Diamond Peak was evaluated against the 110 criteria in the STOKE Snow standard by an independent evaluator, Pete Blanchard. The ski area achieved

an overall compliance score of 78% across all four categories of sustainability performance, making it the second STOKE Certified ski area behind Oregon's Mt. Ashland Ski Area.







"I've been fortunate to call this mountain home for my entire career," said Mike Bandelin, Diamond Peak's general manager who has worked his way up from a parking lot attendant at the resort back in 1984. "A lot has changed over the years, but Diamond Peak still has that friendly, local feel and remains dedicated to the community and our environment. STOKE provided us a roadmap to make short and long-term strategic changes for achieving a more sustainable future of Diamond Peak Ski Resort. I'm extremely proud of everyone here for making this achievement possible." Sustainability Coordinator for Diamond Peak and the Incline Village General Improvement District (IVGID), Joseph Hill who created the ski resort's Interpretation Plan, guides the free Interpretive Mountain Tours, and leads many of IVGID's Waste Not initiatives—added "It's been an honor to step into this role at IVGID to support the ski resort as well as the community in creating and achieving its conservation and community development goals. The STOKE process has proven invaluable to the success of sustainability on the mountain and in Incline Village and we look forward to working closely with STOKE to keep improving by sourcing 100% renewable energy and progressing towards zero waste."



ALERT TAHOE FIRE CAMERA NETWORK By Claudia Andersen, CEO of Parasol Tahoe Community Foundation

At the Parasol Tahoe Community Foundation our priority is to keep our community strong and safe. Therefore, I am pleased to inform you that Parasol has provided the funding to complete the AlertTahoe fire camera network located within the Lake Tahoe Basin. With a grant of \$42,500 from our Community Fund, we are funding the final two cameras of the eleven-camera system, which is a project of UNR. The system combines innovative technology with on the ground firefighting efforts to protect our Tahoe communities. It consists of networked sensors designed to protect the Tahoe Basin from catastrophic wildfires, earthquakes, and other natural hazards. This system is on an independent network that remains connected, even during emergencies or outages. This network senses smoke, catches wildfires and alerts firefighters before the fires spread beyond a containable distance. Also, on days when there are multiple fires, this system allows fire managers to determine how to best deploy limited resources to

have the most positive impact. We want to acknowledge the Tahoe Prosperity Center for their efforts in fundraising for the original nine AlertTahoe cameras. To date, these cameras have stopped 55 fires in the Tahoe Basin before they reached one acre in size.

Additionally, the Parasol Tahoe Community Foundation is committed to supporting the viability of this important safety network into the future. Therefore, I'm pleased to announce that Parasol has opened an AlertTahoe Maintenance Endowment which will provide funding for maintenance of the AlertTahoe network in perpetuity. We are asking the community to join us in this most important effort. And to kickstart this maintenance fund, Parasol will match every dollar contributed up to a total of \$55,000. COMMUNITY SERVICES MASTER PLAN Update And Timeline

In September 2016, The Incline Village General Improvement District (IVGID) kicked off a two year-long process of master planning for the future of IVGID Community Services. Community Services encompasses the Beaches, Parks, Recreation Programs, the Recreation Center, The Golf Courses at Incline, and Diamond Peak Ski Resort. The last effort was in 2000 when the Incline Village Recreational Facilities Master Plan was completed. Updating these plans every ten to fifteen years is a good practice as it provides a road map for maintaining and/or revitalizing the existing community amenities and/or expanding the venues to provide new features the community desires.

Our process is that together, we will develop a long-range community services master plan to identify and plan for the future of community driven recreation activities and facilities in Crystal Bay and Incline Village. To date, IVGID has undertaken significant effort to assess many of the existing recreation facilities and operations and has developed planning documents, by venue, that identify the capital maintenance needs as well as the operational enhancement and future infrastructure investment opportunities. Throughout this process, we have conducted four public meetings, IVGID staff interviews, focus group meetings, tabling/ outreach stations, and community surveys (Statistically-valid mail/email survey and open participation on-line survey with hard copies). Through extensive community outreach, we were able to assess expectations, help set priorities, evaluate the opportunities for additional/expanded recreational offerings and facilities, and if identified, assess the community's willingness to fund new or different facilities and programs.

We want to make sure we hear from all of our stakeholders. We realize that many of you don't live here year round but spend lots of time enjoying our facilities when you are here. Every opinion matters as we determine what our programs and facilities should provide over the next decade or more.

This is your chance to make sure that the draft Plan is consistent with the recreational needs expressed during the initial community input process. **If you were unable to attend our public meetings, we encourage your input by emailing your thoughts of the draft plan to CSMP@ivgid.org. You can review the entire draft Master Plan by going to the following link on our website: www.yourtahoeplace.com/ivgid/resources/ community-services-master-plan.** This web page also includes all of the material from the previous community input sessions, and includes a link to all of the previously approved components of the Master Plan for our Beaches, Golf Courses, Ski Area and Tennis Center.

Aspects of the Draft Plan

Needs Matrix - Different communities have specific needs for parks and recreation. A combination of public surveys, meetings, workshops, and other engagement techniques were implemented to evaluate what IVGID residents need most.

Plan Elements & Recommendations were based on feedback from the community and key findings. These elements and recommendations include a focus on improvements in five areas in order to meet community needs: trails; parks, open space, and snow play; fields; built facilities; and programs over the next 10 to 20 years.

Opportunity Sites and Potential Uses


We have been very active over the past four years updating our Master Plans. We have already engaged the community in helping us update the Master Plans for Diamond Peak, our Beaches, Golf Courses and our Tennis Center. This process will focus on the rest of the great programs, activities and facilities that we offer to the community.

The remaining steps in the process will be to work with the consultants on final edits and revisions and for the Board of Trustees to approve the final Plan. We will then work with the community to determine what desired elements of the plan could be implemented in the near and long term future. It is important to note that a Master Plan is a planning document, not a budget document. Board adoption of a Master Plan is not a commitment to funding any of the projects or programs in the Plan; however, it

Trails	Provide opportunities for community interactions and socialization along a connected linear park system that encourages walking and biking and provides places to stop and gather. Support trail planning of the high country to identify appropriate uses and locations. Determine appropriate access points, while respecting neighborhood needs and addressing parking issues. Reinvest in existing facilities such as the Chateau and Aspen Grove to better support rentals and outdoor uses. Implement the <i>Diamond Peak Master Plan</i> . Implement recommendations from the <i>Tennis Center Facilities Assessment and Master Plan</i> .

Develop a Recreation Program Plan to identify program priorities and track trends to adjust programming and leverage services offered by other individuals or organizations. 
does provide a blueprint for determining what potential projects and programs could be implemented if there are resources available for the modification or expansion of our services.

WINTER AT THE CHAMPIONSHIP GOLF COURSE

Stop by the Incline Village Championship Golf Shop this winter to play a virtual round, take a lesson, or do some shopping. There are also usually a couple stalls open at the driving range if you prefer to hit outdoors (weather permitting). Golf Shop hours are 10am - 5pm Tuesday through Saturday (non-holiday).

Play Golf Indoors This Winter

Keep your game alive during the winter by playing virtual golf. Our FlightScope X2 Elite launch monitor and indoor hitting net are setup in the Championship Golf Shop for the off-season. There are a variety of courses to choose from and 18 holes only takes about an hour. Virtual golf rates are \$35 for an hour (\$25 w/ IVGID Pass) or \$20 for 30 minutes (\$15 w/IVGID Pass).

The FlightScope also captures an accurate reading of your swing with Doppler radar, which provides feedback



regarding ball flight, swing path, and launch angles. Our golf pros are able to analyze results from the flight scope and give swing lessons based on those results. Call 775-832-1146 to book winter tee times and lessons.



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GOLF SEASON WRAP-UP & FAREWELL Michael McCloskey Director of Golf

Both golf courses have benefited from an 'average' summer season as it relates to weather conditions and general golfing traffic. I can say that both Jeff, our Superintendent, & I are much happier during a summer season like 2018 versus the challenges we faced in 2017!

The Championship Golf Course surpassed total rounds played from 2017 as well as total rounds budgeted for the season. The Championship Course has played just over 22,796 rounds of golf since opening on May 11th. We had a warm & dry October to finish the season. Financially, the Championship Course, through October in the 18/19 budget, we have seen an increase in revenue & an increase in expenses. Generally, the growth continues to come from the success of our food & beverage offerings at the Chateau & Championship Course.

In September, we typically host a plethora of outside/corporate tournaments, primary reasons for that is the decrease in cost of lodging for corporate groups as well as the lodging occupancies. We hosted our two high profile events in the middle of this month, TJ Invitational & Lake Tahoe STAG. The TJ Invitational celebrated their 52nd year of their golf tournament. We have been fortunate enough to be the host location of that event for 50 of its 52 years. Their elaborate event included 112 golfers for two rounds of golf, a luncheon, and plenty of on course activities. The following day, another large corporate event called Lake Tahoe STAG occupied both golf courses for business. They are a repeat event that have been at our facilities since 2002. The event host is a resident of Incline Village/Crystal Bay. They had 104 golfers at the Championship Golf Course and 40 golfers at the Mountain Golf Course teeing off at the same time. They hosted a lunch and open tab with our food & beverage outlets; they also pre-ordered merchandise goods from our golf shop for tee prizes. Within the three consecutive days on property, they spent just over





\$100,000 with our departments at golf. I highlight this information and share this story because I think it gives a clear indication of how important these large corporate events are to the success of our golf courses. Both of these groups came from the Hyatt, which also demonstrates the importance of that relationship. The Championship Course also played host to two resident charity events this fall with the Hospital Auxiliary & the Bob Wheeler Memorial Invitational.

The Mountain Golf Course has had a whirlwind of a 50th Anniversary season. The kitchen fire on August 11th posed as a very sad and challenging operational shift to overcome. I am VERY proud of our team and new Head Professional at the Mountain Course, who have overcome the dilemma by sustaining the continual growth in play and services that we offer at the Mountain. I am going to steal a quote from one of our die-hard customers of the Mountain Course Bruce Gordon, in which on the day of the fire he stated: "Only at Incline Village would the staff lose their clubhouse due to a fire and still service the golf course like nothing happened". We are certainly proud of the services we provide to our residents and guests!

As for rounds, I am excited to share that the Mountain Course exceeded its TOTAL rounds played from the 2017 season and exceeded the 2018 season budgeted rounds. A large contributor to the success in growing rounds has come from the Play Pass promotion this spring. Total Play Pass rounds at the Mountain Course have increased by 85% compared to 2017!

Despite the fire, financially the Mountain Course revenues increased in the current

18/19 budget. This revenue increase has come solely from operations, as our food & beverage operation has been reduced to a grab & go fashion of service. Alternatively, with the operational change due to the fire, operational expenses have dropped slightly in the current budget. Although the current model of food & beverage, without a kitchen, is not what we desire to offer in the coming seasons, it is giving us a good indication for what we think we should/can offer moving forward. Additionally, the kitchen fire was a scary and sad situation, but we think this process has given us a lot of insight of how we want to balance the food &

beverage needs of the operation versus the financial impact of those operational needs.

The program participation at the Mountain Course was high in 2018, which brought more rounds, revenue, and more importantly new golfers to the game.

I would be amiss if I did not address course conditions in my wrap-up. With the benefit of a desirable spring and the opportunity to conduct significant repairs to the course last fall, the course conditions at both courses have been some of the best I have seen in the 11



seasons I have been with the District. We have received continuous comments from both residents and visitors alike applauding our all-around conditions. Jeff, George (the new Assistant Superintendent), Jose and their teams have done an outstanding job getting the golf courses up to standard after a testing year in 2017. As we did last fall, we have started fall maintenance work with the aim of prepping the courses for the winter ahead. I cannot stress enough how important the fall maintenance preparations are for next seasons success.

Winterize to Avoid Frozen Pipes

Washoe County Roads Winter Parking Restrictions

Washoe County Community Services Department, who maintains our roads in Incline Village/Crystal Bay, asks residents to call the Community Hotline at 775-833-5555 for current information on snow & ice conditions and on-street parking (Red/Green Day). Please note that Red Day restrictions (no on-street parking) will be in effect until snow operations are completed. Restrictions will be enforced, with possible fines and towing.

Be Sewer Smart with Cooking Oil, Grease and Fats! Dispose Properly

Holiday dinners & gatherings can be fun, but be sewer smart with your cooking oils and fats, and avoid putting them down your drain. Our customers are a vital key to ensuring the community sewer system operates properly. It is extremely important that plumbing fixtures never be used as a trashcan. No Fats, Oils or Grease (FOG) Down the Drain! FOG can be a major problem for local water quality, as well as the sewer lines running from your home. FOG clings to the insides of pipes and travels into the sewer system infrastructure. Over time, FOG can build up and eventually block pipes completely. When wastewater can't move freely through pipes out into the sewer system, it can back up into your home or the sewer main causing unsanitary public health conditions and damages that can be expensive to repair. It is important to dispose of FOG into a heatproof sealable container and once cooled, placed into your regular household trash. The IVGID Public Works office has FREE grease container lids as well as FREE bulk cooking oil drop off available during HHW hours.

Flushable Wipes are NOT flushable!

Wastewater systems all over the country have blockages caused by flushable wipes. Despite the claim, the products are not flushable since they do not break down. They end up causing large blockages which are unpleasant and costly to repair. Wipes should always be disposed of in a trash container.

Don't Flush Prescription Medicine

Prescription and non-prescription medicine should not be flushed down the toilet. Studies have shown that 80% of US streams contain small amounts of human medicine. Sewage systems cannot remove these medicines from water. Very small amounts of medicine have even been found in drinking water. Fish and other aquatic animals have shown adverse effects from medicines in the water. Proper disposal of medication is FREE at the drug drop box inside the Washoe County Sheriff Substation at 625 Mount Rose Hwy, Incline Village. Call 775.832.4107 for hours and additional information.

Fall Prevention & Safety Tips Provided By The North Lake Tahoe Fire Protection District

Test and replace batteries. Check or replace carbon monoxide batteries twice a year; when you change the time on your clocks each spring and fall. Replace smoke alarm alkaline batteries at least once a year. Test alarms every month to ensure they work properly.

Be prepared for cold weather. Prepare your home and car. Have a winter weather checklist that includes emergency preparedness info for communication, making a plan and supplies kit.

Keep stairs and walking areas free of electrical cords, shoes, clothing, books, magazines and other items.

Improve lighting in and outside your home. Use nightlights or a flashlight to light the path between your bedroom and bathroom. Turn on lights before using stairs.

Use non-slip mats in bathtub and shower floors. Install grab bars on the wall next to the bathtub, shower, and toilet if needed.

Stairways should be well lit from both top and bottom. Have easy-to-grip handrails installed along the full length of both sides of stairs.

Be aware of uneven surfaces indoors and outdoors. If you must have scatter rugs, make sure they lay flat and don't slide when you step on them. Be aware of uneven sidewalks and pavement outdoors. Clear ice and snow from outside stairs and walkways and always use hand rails if available. Step carefully.

Wear sturdy, well-fitting low-heeled shoes with non-slip soles. They are safer than slippers, stocking feet, high heels or thick soled athletic shoes.

Consider getting a flu vaccine. Studies show that flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, missed work & school, and flu-related hospitalizations.

If you are looking for a place to hold a social, sporting or special event in Incline Village, we have several venues available. The Recreation Center offers year round facilities for indoor events with amenities that include a lobby for birthday parties, indoor gymnasium and indoor pool. Incline and Burnt Cedar beaches have several Group Picnic areas available to beach access pass holders to reserve for spring or summer events. The designated beach sites include barbecue grills and tables offering you and your friends an area to picnic and enjoy the beach. Two sites are available at Burnt Cedar and two at Incline Beach. These sites can only be reserved with a valid IVGID Picture Pass with beach access. Each guest is still responsible for beach access fees. There is one site available at Preston Park which is perfect for a family gathering or your child's birthday party and can be reserved by both IVGID pass holders & non pass holders



In addition, Village Green, Preston Field and Incline Park offer wide open spaces for activities and have multiuse fields for your soccer, softball and baseball needs. These sites are available to both IVGID pass holders & non pass holders. Reservations for all sites are taken on a first-come, first-served basis at the Parks & Recreation Department Counter. Payment is required with your application.

DISC GOLF COURSE

The North Tahoe Lions Club Disc Golf course includes 18 par 3 holes in a picturesque setting located within Incline Park adjacent to the Tennis Center, Recreation Center, Skateboard Park and the Ball Fields. This is a free multi-use area to be enjoyed by all ages. The Disc Golf Course was created through a partnership between the Incline Village Parks & Recreation Department and the Incline Tahoe Foundation with generous community donations. Incline Skate Park, centrally located on the corner of Tahoe Blvd (Hwy 28) and Southwood Blvd. in Incline Park, has something to offer everyone. In the middle of the park is a 3-foot tall fun box, and the entire right side of the small end is a 2.5-foot tall bowl for beginners. The street course is laid out on top, flowing in a circle with an 8-foot long flat rail, 6-foot long down rail, a set of 4 stairs, and a 10-foot long downward ramp leading into the bowls.

FITNESS TRAIL

The Incline Village Fitness Trail (previously known as the Exercourse) is an 18-station exercise course adjacent to the Village Green. The .8 mile course winds through the forest next to Incline Creek. The course contains accessible walking, running, snowshoeing, biking and exercise trails, and is used by many residents and visitors year-round. The Fitness Trail was updated in partnership with the Incline Tahoe Foundation and community funds.
